WHAT WE DO

A vital piece of providing a quality early learning environment is having highly qualified educators who remain consistent in the classroom. The WAGE\$ program promotes this environment by offering education-based salary supplements to educators who work in licensed child care programs.

Eligible educators can receive anywhere from \$600 to \$7,800 annually, deposited directly into their bank accounts to use however they wish. The more early childhood college courses the educator has, the higher the incentive. Review the eligibility requirements below to see if you qualify to receive a salary supplement through Child Care WAGES® Tennessee today.

WHO MAY QUALIFY

A WAGE\$ supplement is available to early childhood educators who meet the following criteria:

- 1. Work in a Tennessee Department of Human Services licensed child care program
- 2. Earn \$20 or less per hour
- 3. Have one of the education levels listed in our Salary Supplement Scale (credits must be from a regionally accredited school)
- 4. Have worked at least 6 months in the same licensed child care program with children ages birth to 5 at least 10 hours per week
- 5. Be employed at this same licensed child care program when funding is available and a final confirmation has been completed
