

The presenters have over 15 years of experience facilitating early STEM workshops for educators, and they will share resources, ideas, and tips from multiple existing organizations to enhance teaching practice. Attendees will get ideas to use both on and off-device, and they will get a materials kit to take back to the classroom to use right away. This training will help to explain how a child's early relationship experiences set the stage for future brain functioning. We will show how healthy brain relationships depend on the quality and reliability of a young child's relationships with the most important people in his or her life.

FILLING YOUR TOOLBOX: CO-REGULATION TOOLS FOR INFANTS AND YOUNG CHILDREN

Presenter: Kristin Williams & Josie Davis

Self-regulation is a learned skill that does not come naturally to children. It is up to caregivers to teach children healthy tools that help manage their emotions through co-regulation. Presenters will discuss how to co-regulate in three steps: provide a warm, responsive relationship; structure the environment; and teach self-regulation skills. Attendees will leave with coregulation tools they can use in their classroom when big feelings arise. Children all learn and grow differently, therefore, not all tools work for every child. The more tools in our toolbox, the more resources, and techniques we have to utilize successfully.

Children who have experienced adversity, early harm, toxic stress, and/or trauma often have complex needs that impact their behavior and learning. This session will introduce the practical strategies of Trust-Based Relational Intervention to support anyone that works with children to help them meet their highest potential.

DIVERSE INTERACTIVE READ ALOUDS FOR PRIMARY STUDENTS

OPENING KEYNOTE CREATING CARING COMMUNITIES: INCLUSION AND BELONGING FOR EACH AND EVERY CHILD

Is your early childhood space created for each and every child and family? Building early childhood spaces with your children and families in mind, is the beginning of creating a community where each and every child and family feel like they are valued, respected, and belong. In this session, learn how to create community through the design of your physical and social environment, engaging and partnering with families, and providing supports to ensure all children are included in meaningful ways.



Dr. Mary Louise Hemmeter is a professor of Special Education at Vanderbilt University and the Nicholas Hobbs Chair in Special Education and Human Development. Her research focuses on effective instruction, supporting social emotional development and addressing challenging behavior, and coaching teachers. She has directed numerous multi-site projects funded by the US Departments of Education and Health and Human Services. Through her work on the National Center on the Social Emotional Foundations for Early Learning and IESfunded research projects, she was involved in the development of the Pyramid Model for Supporting Social Emotional Competence in Young Children and the Practice Based Coaching Model. She is currently leading projects focused on addressing children's social, emotional, and behavioral health in community based early childhood programs and pre-k and kindergarten classrooms in public schools. She has a specific interest in reducing the use of exclusionary discipline practices in early childhood settings. She is a co-author on the Connect4Learning Early Childhood Curriculum, the Teaching Pyramid Observation Tool (TPOT) and the Teaching Pyramid Infant Toddler Observation Tool (TPITOS). She has received several awards including the Merle B. Karnes Service to the Division Award and the Mary McEvoy Service to the Field Award.

CLOSING KEYNOTE TOP INGREDIENT FOR MAKING A DIFFERENCE --YOUR WELL-BEING!

Drawn to Early Education due to our values of compassion, service, and dedication to shaping positive futures, we likely have deep-rooted identity formation around helping. We entered our roles discovering the joy of "compassion satisfaction" – feeling good about making a difference through relationship. When we experience compassion fatigue or burnout, it's in conflict with our values. This closing session reminds us to care for ourselves as we care for others so that we can avoid burnout and find a renewed passion and energy. Come and learn hands-on techniques to access your "super powers" for daily renewal!



Patti van Eys, PhD is a licensed clinical psychologist who specializes in the complexities of traumatic experience and mental health challenges. She offers consultation, supervision, legal expertise, training, and evaluation services for individuals and systems. She began her career as a clinician at the National Children's Advocacy Center in Huntsville, Alabama where she gained formative experience working with children and adults with complex maltreatment trauma. She draws on experience as a full-time psychology professor at Vanderbilt University: as clinical director of the Vanderbilt University Center of Excellence for Children in State Custody, a center serving high risk, complex youth and providing intensive trauma training for the service system; as Chief Clinical Officer of Omni Visions, Inc., serving foster youth and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities; and as Manager of Behavioral Health at BlueCare Tennessee, serving TennCare recipients. Dr. van Eys has trained extensively at the local, regional, and national level on trauma informed care and mental health issues. She is an active advocate for changing person-serving systems toward a more inclusive, compassionate, healing centered approach.


